What is the greatest pleasure of life? If anybody asks this question, different people may hold different views and acclaim aesthetic, intellectual, or typical ethical pleasure as their specific choice. There is, however, no second opinion that the greatest pleasures of life come from reading good books. Indeed, books bring immense joy, enlarge the frontiers of knowledge and

widen the outlook of the reader.

Happy is the man who acquires the habit of reading when he is young. He has secured a lifelong source of pleasure, instruction and inspiration. So long as he has his beloved books, he never feels lonely. He always has a pleasant occupation of **leisure** moments, so that he never feels bored. He is the possessor of wealth more precious than gold. Poor indeed is the man who does not read, and empty is his life.

The blessings which the reading habit **confers** on its possessor are many provided that we choose the right kind of books. Reading gives the highest kind of pleasure. We read some books, simply for pleasure and amusement. Good novels and books of imagination must have their place in everybody's reading. When we are tired or the



brain is weary with serious study, it is a healthy recreation to **immerse** ourselves in some absorbing story written by a master hand.

It is said, 'Reading is to the mind what exercise is to the body.' That is why a civilized man is drawn to a good book more than he is drawn to any other form of entertainment like the movies, the television or football and cricket. The pleasure derived from the other entertainment may also be good, but their effect is not as lasting as the effect of reading.

Different kinds of books give us different types of pleasure. There are numerous books to please and satisfy different readers. There are many informative books on history, biography, philosophy, religion, travel, and science which we ought to read, and which will give us not only pleasure but also education and knowledge. Apart from it, reading poetry also holds immense importance, for the best poetry gives us the noble thoughts and beautiful imaginings clothed in lovely and musical language.

As a matter of fact, books are our everlasting friends. They stay with us during the whole life: in babyhood we hear parents read us fairy tales, in our teens we **swallow** exciting suspense novels page after page and when we become adults we still find gripping books that absorb us. But today many

people say that modern life is so fast and full of action that they do not have time and desire to read books; they consider reading to be nothing more than waste of time. Furthermore there are a lot of people who are sure that products of modern technologies like computers can replace traditional books. Nevertheless, there are people, who receive pleasure from reading books and believe that books will never disappear from their lives. They feel certain that books teach us what is right and what is wrong; they enrich the inner world of a reader and certainly entertain him.

Nevertheless, reading is a trend that is slowly **diminishing** as other media which seem more attractive are taking its place. More and more people prefer to watch TV or surf on the Internet instead of reading. Though mainly reading is the best way to make your brain work. When we read a book we entirely immerse into it: we try to **conjure** how the characters look like, how we would behave if we were in the shoes of this or that character – our brain doesn't stop working. Books contain grains of wisdom. They give us sound moral advice and teach us what is right and what is wrong.

A book guides us in different ways. It is a friend and a teacher. Books teach people to live. After reading some books it is easy to understand what should be done and what must not be done. Book also gives a unique chance to link up with authors who lived in different ages and countries. Through reading books we hear their voices, thoughts and feelings.

We can say that books are a veritable treasure: you can never be lonely in the company of a good book. Actually reading is such an amazing habit: the deeper you **delve** into it, the more you are drawn to it. Reading is a nice means to relax and de-stress after a hard day. However, books not only entertain us and provide valuable knowledge, but they also sharpen our intellect, encourage imagination and enhance vocabulary.

Writing

Précis:

A précis is a concise and clear statement of the substance of a longer passage in a connected and readable shape. A précis must be accurate, brief and clear. A précis should be about one-third of the original passage.

Rules for writing a good Précis:

(i) Determine the theme of the passage: It is very important to find out the central idea or the theme of the passage. Soon you will be analyzing the passage to separate the major points from the minor ones, and the various points become major only in relation to the central or main theme of the passage.

- (ii) Précis is not the reproduction of important sentences: Do not form your précis by reproducing a few sentences and deleting others. Précis writing is not the art of selection and deletion; it is the art of remodeling.
- (iii) Brevity is good but not at the cost of clarity: Brevity is the soul of précis writing. But brevity is not to be achieved at the cost of clarity. If the addition or retention of a few words add to the clarity of your précis, they should be included by all means.
- (iv) Use your own language: Précis has to be written, as far as possible, in your own words.
- (v) Précis is always written in the third person: If the author has used the autobiographical form of narration or description, you should change the form. You should begin your précis with 'The author says...' Secondly, you should avoid the use of direct speech in your précis. The use of indirect speech will make it more compact.
- (vi) No comments please! You are not supposed to give any comments, appreciative or critical, on the ideas expressed in the passage. Your job is to interpret faithfully and not to evaluate the mind of the author. You are reproducing briefly and relevantly and not creating.
- (vii) Reduce the passage to its one third: Unless otherwise indicated, you are supposed to reduce the passage to one-third of its original length.

Changing the narration

Direct Speech

In direct speech we repeat speaker's exact words. These words are in quotation marks, for example, He said, 'I am working hard.'

Indirect Speech

In indirect speech we do not repeat speaker's exact words rather it is a report on what someone else said or wrote without using that person's exact words, for example, He said that he was working hard.

Etiquettes of interacting with audience

- Be relaxed and confident.
