They stretch'd in never-ending line

In such a **jocund** company!
I gazed- and gazed-but little thought
What wealth the show to me had brought;

For oft, when on my couch I lie
In vacant or in **pensive** mood,
They **flash** upon that inward eye
Which is the **bliss** of **solitude**;
And then my heart with pleasure fills,
And dances with the daffodils.

Syllable division and Stress pattern

Syllable

A syllable is a word or part of a word that has only one vowel sound, e.g. the word 'son' has only one syllable and the word 'father' has two syllables. In a dictionary a dot /./ shows the syllable division. A word can have one or more than one dots. One dot in a word means two syllables. Two dots mean three syllables. Three dots mean four syllables.

Examples

grate.ful

for.get.ful

Stress

Stress is the pronunciation of a word or syllable with more force than the surrounding words or syllables. In a dictionary the mark /' shows the main stress in a word as `able, ap`pear.

Grammar

Figurative language including similes and metaphors

Figurative language

Figurative language uses unusual comparisons to make writing more interesting. For example, in general sense, the word 'strike' means to hit but in figurative language it can be used in another sense as well.

Examples

- i. He struck me with a stick.
- ii. An idea struck my mind.

(In the second sentence the word 'struck' is used in figurative sense.)

Similes

Simile is that figure of speech in which we compare two different things because of something common in them, by using words 'as' or 'like'.

Examples

- i. Aliya is as busy as bee.
- ii. He is as brave as a lion.
- iii. The cloud looked like cotton.
- iv. The cheese felt like rubber.

Metaphors

Metaphors compare two different things without using the words 'like' or 'as'. We can also say that metaphors compare two different things by saying that one thing is another.

Examples

- i. The moon was white marble.
- ii. She has a heart of stone.
- iii. He proved to be a tiger in the fight.
- iv. You have the voice of a wolf.

Creating imagery

Imagery

Imagery is a vivid language that helps the reader form a mental picture of events/scenes through the visual sense as well as the senses of sight, hearing,

touch, smell or taste. In other words we can also say that it is a literary term used for the language and description that appeals to our five senses.

Example

- i. A frigid wind rattled the bare branches.
- ii. A host, of golden daffodils; beside the lake, beneath the trees,
Fluttering and dancing in the breeze.

Literary techniques

Repetition, personification and alliteration

Repetition

Repetition is a technique in language that repeats the same words or phrases to make an idea clearer.

Examples

- i. 'My conscience hath a thousand several tongues,
And every tongue brings in a several tale,
And every tale condemns me for a villain.'
- ii. 'A horse is a horse, of course, of course,
And no one can talk to a horse, of course,
That is of course, unless the horse is the famous Mister Ed.'

Personification

Personification is a figure of speech in which a thing or an idea is given human attributes. The non-human objects are portrayed in such a way that we feel they have the ability to act like human beings.

Examples

- i. The wind whispered through dry grass.

Alliteration

The repetition of consonant sounds, usually at the beginning of words in a line of a poetry or prose is called alliteration.
