An adverb is a word that describes or gives more information about a verb, adjective, or other adverb.

Examples

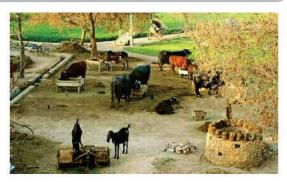

Main, Subordinate and relative Clause Main and Subordinate Clause

As we know that a clause is a group of words which does have a finite verb, and it may or may not make complete sense. If it makes complete sense by itself, then it can be called a main clause (independent clause). But, if it does not make sense by itself, and needs to be joined to another clause to make sense, then it is known as subordinate clause (dependent clause)

Example

We reached the station after the train had left.

In the above sentence, 'we reached the station' is the main clause. The second part, 'after the train had left' does not make sense by itself (though it does have a finite verb) and so it is a subordinate clause.

Remember!

We can also say that a subordinate clause is typically introduced by a conjunction, and is dependent on a main clause, though it has a subject and a verb, cannot stand as a sentence, for example, 'when it rang' is a subordinate clause.

She answered the phone when it rang.

Relative clauses

Relative clauses are introduced by **relative pronouns** (who, whose, whom, which, that) or **relative adverbs** (when, where, why).

> Prepositions normally go after relative pronouns. In formal speech prepositions can go before whom and which only (not before who/that/whose).

Syllable division and Stress pattern Syllable

ROAD SAFETY

Everyday many people face road accidents. Some are killed and some are injured or **maimed**. So, it is important for us to learn how to use the roads properly and safely. No sensible / careful person would like to be involved in an accident.

As the roads are very busy now-a-days, we should be very careful while crossing a road. It is safer to use a pedestrian crossing or an overhead bridge whenever one is available. Never cross a road by **dashing** across it. That is inviting trouble. If there are no crossings, then we must look carefully at right and left and cross only when it is safe.

Some of us take bus to school. It is important that we do not try to get on or off a bus while it is still moving. We must not fool around while in the bus. A sudden **lurch** can send us knocking our heads against something hard.

Riding a bicycle can be dangerous too. We must pay attention on the road and never cycle too far out to the middle of the road. We must obey all traffic rules. Also we must make sure our bicycles are in good condition with working brakes, lights etc.

We should avoid over-speeding. Find out what causes you to speed up? Is there an urge to speed when you have a driver close behind? Or, is it an effort to keep up with the traffic flow? Or, do you simply enjoy over-taking? It is especially important to low the speed while approaching schools, on narrow roads, hilly areas, rural areas and when visibility is poor. Wet roads and over-speeding may cause an accident.

Traffic rules have been designed with **safety foremost** in mind. It takes into account safety for all, including pedestrians. Preference is to be given to pedestrians and children in crossing the road. Follow the lane, and keep the required distance between vehicles. It is important to display appropriate

indications/signals especially while changing lanes or before a turn. Respect for other drivers on the road is obligatory to road safety.

A seat belt, also known as a safety belt, is a vehicle safety belt, which is designed to secure the persons, sitting in vehicle, against

harmful movement that may result during a collision or a sudden stop. A seat belt reduces the risk of death or serious injury in a traffic accident.









Traffic signs are very important as they warn about 'accident prone spots' so that the driver can reduce the speed of the vehicle. Signboards on the road are vital clues about road design so that the person behind the wheel can exercise caution.

There should be no compromise on the quality of brakes and tyres. Further, it is imperative to inflate tyres with the right air pressure to avoid tyre bursts on road. Apart from it lights and indicators should be in proper working condition.

Road safety is a collective responsibility of the government and people. We should always drive carefully and take all pre-cautionary steps for our safety. The important thing is to stay alert at all times while using the roads. We must know what is happening around us. In that way we can take necessary action to avoid danger whenever we see one. Road safety is very much up to how we use the roads. Use them carefully and we may be able to use them for a long time. Use them carelessly and we may never be able to use them again.

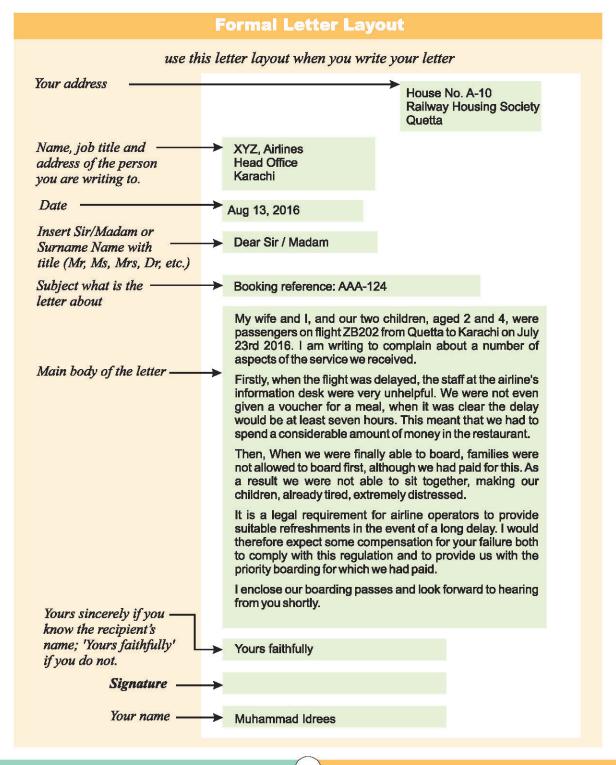

Faith means a firm belief, confidence and trust in Allah. The Muslims have a strong belief which distinguishes them from the followers of other religions. They believe in one Allah and the finality of the Nabuwat of Hazrat Muhammad-ur-Rasool Ullah Khatam-un-Nabiyeen (المن المناب ال



could practise the teachings of Islam without fear. They struggled for this belief and won an independent country, Pakistan.

Discipline means a mode of life according to rules. Discipline makes sure that people follow the rules of conduct. The Muslims of the Subcontinent showed great discipline during the Pakistan movement. They followed the instructions of their great leaders in letter and spirit. There was no disharmony in their struggle. They performed their individual



roles as parts of a well-oiled machine. Their disciplined efforts bore fruit in the form of our dear country, Pakistan.



During the September, 1965 war, the Pakistani nation again showed her qualities of unity, faith and discipline. The whole nation stood united to face the challenge of enemy. All the men, women and children stood up like a solid rock which the enemy could not break through. The soldiers, the engineers, the doctors, the businessmen, the poets, the artists, the students, the labourers; in short all Pakistanis worked bravely in their own fields and defeated the enemy. There was great discipline in their efforts. Life became more orderly during the war than in peacetime. There were no crimes during the seventeen days war. Faithful Pakistani nation showed the world that it was a nation of true Muslims. Although, we were fighting against an enemy that was five times more powerful in men and arms, the powers of unity, faith and discipline helped us in the successful defense of our homeland.





We must continue to act on the principles of unity, faith and discipline so that our country may develop rapidly and the world may be convinced that we are a united, well-organized and dedicated nation. These principles must be followed by the students specially, because they are the future builders of the nation. The principles of unity, faith and disciple will continue to lead us to greater achievements.

Punctuation

(Quotation Marks)

We use quotation marks to enclose both parts of an interrupted quotation. While using quotation marks we have to separate the speaker tags with comma (,). The speaker tag is the part of the sentence that tells the reader who is talking, for example, he said, exclaimed Hashim, the teacher explained, asked Asma, etc.

Examples

- i. He said, 'It is raining.'
- ii. Maryam said, 'I want to be a doctor.'
- iii. Father said, 'Bring me a glass of water.'

We can make both of these sentences into interrupted quotations by putting the speaker tag in the middle of the quoted sentence.

The speaker tag consists of 'speakers' name and a speech related verb. It shows which character is speaking.

Examples

- i. 'I need the car today,' my brother said, 'so I can go to work.'
- ii. 'When you do your math homework today,' <u>explained the teacher</u>, 'remember to show all of your work tomorrow.'

Rules for using interrupted quotations:

i) Use <u>quotation marks</u> around both parts of the interrupted quotation Examples

- 'The book,' whispered the librarian, 'is on the second shelf by the wall.'
- 'When father comes home,' my brother said, 'tell him I'm going to market.'

ii) Quotations are separated from the speaker tag with commas

- i. For first half of the quotation, put comma inside the quotation marks.
- ii. For second half of the quotation, put comma after the speaker tag.

Examples

'Did you know', asked the teacher, 'that the whales are mammals?'

iii) Follow normal capitalization rules

i. Capitalize the first word in the sentence.

Example

'Your pigeon flew away', he said, 'because you left the cage open.'

ii. The second half of the quotation does not begin with a capital letter, unless it is a proper noun or title.

Examples

'Please tell your father,' the man on the phone said, 'Qasim will call you back.'

HANDICRAFTS OF BALOCHISTAN

Balochistan has a long tradition in the production of handicrafts. This tradition began centuries ago and is still progressing day by day. Balochistan handicrafts are known all over the world for the beauty of their design, the richness of their colour and their economical prices. Besides being popular within the country, these



handicrafts are exported to various foreign countries where they are warmly received especially by the people of the west.

Handicraft skills in Balochistan are **ancestral**, having been passed from one generation to the other. Embroidery and needle work of Balochistan are especially very attractive. This work is done by the women and girls. They do not have to go out of their houses for work. They attend to their household work and in their spare time, they produce handicrafts which add to the family income. Age is no **barrier** in doing embroidery work. Women, young and old girls take part in the production of embroidered handicrafts. The handicrafts needle work is common all over the



province of Balochistan. The women folk spend hours in doing the embroidery work as a means of earning for the family.

Needle-work in Balochistan displays different designs and embroidery techniques which **vary** from place to place. Different areas of Balochistan are known for their distinctive designs.

Dera Bugti is famous for 'Kowchik' form of embroidery. The 'Kowchik' stitching has its own pattern which is embroidered on shawls and shirts for the women. The fame of the 'Kowchik' design was once spread all over the Subcontinent of Indo-Pakistan, and it is still very popular everywhere in Pakistan.

Kalat and Khuzdar districts are famous for their 'Moshamka' needlework. It involves stich work in different colours, usually red, green and grey on white or yellow garments. It is also embroidered on shawls, cushions, table-

cloth and bed-sheets. It may also include the use of tiny mirror work.

Sibi district is well known for her 'Jok' needle work in which fine thread of various colours and shades is used. The 'Jok' work is very popular all over the country for the delicacy of its design.

The needle-work of Muslimbagh, Gulistan and Zhob areas has a peculiar appeal of its own. In it a number of designs are produced through the use of open and close



stitches. Though the work involves lesser labour and lesser quantity of thread than that needed for the other designs of embroidery, it is specially selected for the bridal dresses and colourful garments for small kids.

The Afghan refugees brought with them a number of new designs and techniques in needle-work. The Afghan women are especially good in embroidery and they spend most of their time in making rich and colourful designs seen at the handicraft shops in Quetta.



Besides the needle- work on dresses, cushions and bed-sheets, embroidered Balochi chapals of Balochistan are a special attraction for the people. Their beauty and artistic value is a matter of pride for those who put them on. Embroidery is done on fine leather using colourful thread and fine golden and silver wire. Embroidered caps, purses and belts are also much in demand. These articles are the items of special attraction for the tourists who visit the handicraft shops in Balochistan.

Large deposits of marble stone provide the material for the production of beautiful objects. Marble table-sets, ash-trays, bath-tubs and decoration pieces add to the glamour of the houses and offices. Crude marble is dug out in the Chaghi district of Balochistan and transported to the industrial centres of the country including Hub where the stone is



transformed into attractive forms and polished before the items are sent to the market.

Carpets and wall hangings of Balochistan are another source of attraction for the customers. Carpets form not only a special part of the setting in tribal households but the tradition has also won a place of popularity in the city homes. Balochi hand-woven carpets are an important source of foreign exchange earnings for the country.

Pottery and ornaments have always been the symbols of the development of civilization. The earthen wares of Balochistan depict the mastery of their makers and their variety and delicacy of design fetch good price. Ornaments have always been the items of special interest and attraction for the women. The Balochi ornaments, specially the silver



ornaments show the skill and artistry of the **craftsmen**. The whole process of ornament production from the point of melting the metal to the finished product is accomplished without using any machine. They are in great demand at the national and international jewellery markets.

The handicrafts industry of Balohistan is encouraged and supported at the government level. It adds to the foreign exchange earnings in addition to providing jobs to thousands. The handicrafts also boost up the image of the country in international circles because they reflect the artistic temperament of a nation.

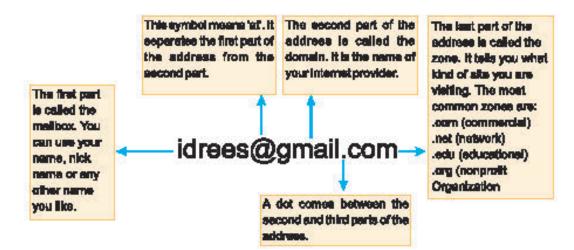

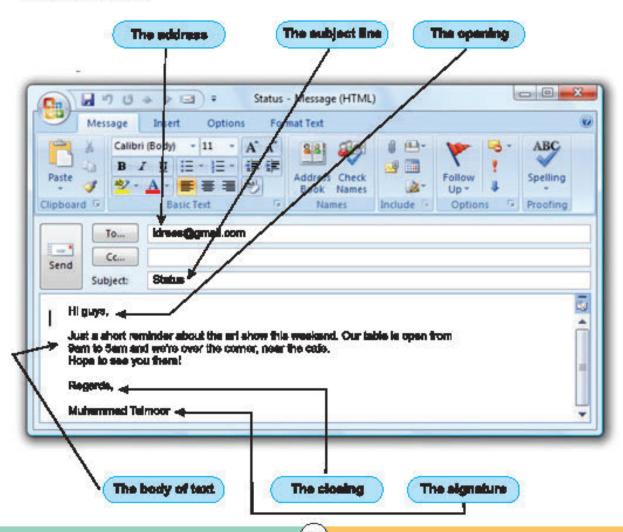

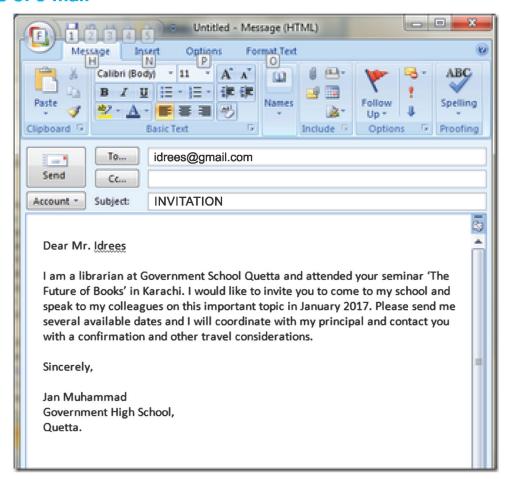

Grammar

Infinitive and infinitive phrase

Infinitive

An infinitive is the simple present form of a verb used as either a noun, adjective, or adverb. The verb of the infinitive is normally preceded by the word 'to', for example, to deliver, to obey, to discuss, etc. to + 1st form of the verb is called 'full infinitive'.

Examples

- She wants to become a doctor.
- We all have to work hard.
- I want to go to Peshawar.

1. Bare Infinitive

When an infinitive is used without 'to', it is called a bare infinitive. The infinitive is used without 'to' after certain verbs like bid, let, make, see dare etc. We also use bare infinitives after modal auxiliary verbs. (can, could, may, might, must, will would, shall, should)

Examples

- Let him sit here.
- I can <u>speak</u> English.
- He made me write a letter.

2. Split Infinitive

Split infinitive takes place when additional words are included between 'to' and the verb form in an infinitive. This practice should be avoided in formal writing.

Examples

- I like to on a nice day walk in the woods.
- He needed to quickly gather his personal possessions.

3. An infinitive phrase

An infinitive phrase is the infinitive plus any complements and any modifiers of the infinitive and complements.

Examples

Trees add beauty to the world we live in. Whenever we think of any place where we can enjoy ourselves and rest comfortably, trees always make an **essential** part of the scene. No place of beauty in the world is complete without

trees. That is why when we have to select a picnic spot, we generally keep in mind the presence of shady trees.

Trees have helped man in discovering new places. For the earliest man it

was very difficult and dangerous to travel on land. He must have used tree-trunks to travel on the rivers. Then large boats and ships were built of wood and man was able to move from one part of the world to the other. Our history owes much to the trees whose wood helped large armies to move across to the foreign lands.



Trees provide the raw material for many industries. Commercially, they

are **invaluable**. Furniture, boats, doors and window frames are made from wood. Paper is manufactured from wood. Similarly the blessed tree olive is one of the oldest trees of history. It is cultivated with variety of soils and ecological zones. It holds a significant economic value. Its fruit as well as wood is very worthwhile. Its fruit is specially used for edible oil and for different medicines also. Spain is the largest producer of olive oil in the world, growing olive trees on 2-6 million hectares area. Allah Almighty has blessed Pakistan with a suitable climate to grow olive trees over 4.4 million hectares area in all parts of the country.





Some countries have plenty of trees. They are prosperous because of their large forests. Good timber is sold for good cash. Malaysia is the largest producer of natural rubber in the world. Rubber is collected from rubber trees. So trees earn a lot of revenue for them.

Trees also serve us in many other commercial ways. They produce delicious fruits which we eat. We sell them to other countries, too. Pakistan exports apples, mangoes and oranges in large quantities and earns a lot of foreign exchange.

The leaves, the bark (outer-skin) and roots of trees are used for making different kinds of medicines. There was a time when malaria would kill large number of people. Malaria has been controlled by **quinine** which is made from Cinchona tree. Corks are obtained from the trunks of the cork-oak. Corks are used as stoppers for bottles.

The trees play a very important role in agriculture and farming. They check the force of winds and rain. They help to preserve land. The roots of trees bind the soil together. They do not allow rain water to carry away the rich soil.

The trees prevent landslides and soil erosion in floods. They also preserve animal and bird life.

Trees help regulate the atmosphere. They absorb carbon dioxide and give out oxygen. Cutting and burning of trees lead to ever greater quantities of carbon mono-oxide being released. The gases make a blanket around the earth, which holds in the heat of the sun. This holding in of the heat is known as the 'green house effect'.

People living in cold countries keep their potted plants in glass rooms during winter. The glass-rooms allow the rays of the sun to give warmth and light to the plants. But they do not let the temperature inside fall to freezing points. Thus the plants are saved during the winter





months. The glass-rooms where potted plants are kept are known as green house. The cover of carbon mono-oxide around the earth is making the whole world a big 'green house'. This situation is extremely dangerous for the future of the world and for the life on earth.

The increase in average world temperature is going to melt more and more ice near the poles. The amount of water will increase in the oceans and thus raise their level. Some islands in the South western Pacific are already the danger of being submerged.

People all over the world will have to make efforts to increase the number of trees so that a happy and healthy future of the world is ensured.

Writing

Persuasive Essay

A persuasive essay expresses an opinion about something and shows why that opinion makes sense. The writer tries to get the reader to agree with that opinion.

Guidelines for writing a persuasive Essay

- Begin by getting your audience's attention and by stating your opinion.
- Offer three reasons for your view. Give each reason its own paragraph, and use facts and details to support it.
- Give the strongest reason last.
- Write a conclusion. Restate your opinion, and then call upon the reader to take action.

Example of a persuasive essay

What can I do?

Do you ever think about people in your community who need help? 'What can I do?' you might ask. 'I don't have any money. I am just a kid.' There are many ways you can help others—if you are willing to volunteer.

Volunteering doesn't cost anything but time. Take a look at the way you spend your time. If you add up the time you waste, you may find several hours a week that you could use to help someone. The help can be something simple. For example, you might give an elderly neighbour a hand with shopping. You

might form a classroom 'clean team' to straighten things up once or twice a week. You might read to a younger sister or brother. There are all kinds of things that you could do.

Volunteering can also be educational. Depending on your volunteer job, you might get to know new people. These people might have interesting stories to tell you about themselves and their families. You also might learn new skills-skills that could be useful to you in the future.

Most important, volunteering helps you personally. I know, because it has happened to me, by volunteering, I learned to care more about other people and to be more understanding. I like and value myself more because I help others.

By volunteering, you can make a difference, help others, and help yourself. Why not look around, find a job that needs to be done, and then volunteer to do it.

First aid is the assistance given to any person suffering a sudden illness or injury to preserve life, prevent the condition from worsening and promote recovering. It is the temporary and immediate help. Any lay man can be trained to administer first aid. First aid knowledge ranges from taking care of cuts to dealing with an unconscious person.

Aims:

The key aims of first aid can be summarized in the following three key points, sometimes known as the three Ps.

- 1. Preserve life: The most important aim of first aid is to save life and minimize the risk of death.
- 2. Prevent further harm: This covers both external factors such as moving a patient away from any cause of harm, and applying first aid techniques to prevent worsening of the condition.
- 3. **Promote recovering:** First aid also involves trying to start the recovering process from injury or illness, and in some cases might involve completing a treatment, such as in the case of applying a plaster to a small wound.

Providing First Aid

Burns, bone fractures, wounds and bleeding often require first aid.

 Stop the bleeding: Minor cuts and scrapes usually stop bleeding on their own. If they do not apply gentle pressure with a clean cloth or bandage. Hold the pressure continuously for 20 to 30



seconds. Do not keep checking to see if the bleeding has stopped because this may damage or **dislodge** the clot that is forming and cause bleeding to resume. If blood **spurts** or continues flowing after continuous pressure, take the victim to hospital immediately.

- Clean the wound: Rinse out the wound with clean water. To clean the area around the wound, use soap and a washcloth. But soap can irritate the wound, so try to keep it out of the actual wound. Cleaning reduces the risk of infection and tetanus. If dirt or debris remains in the wound after washing, use tweezers (cleaned with alcohol) to remove the particles. If debris still remains, go to the doctor.
- Apply an antibiotic: After you clean the wound, apply a thin layer of an antibiotic cream or ointment to help keep the surface moist. The ointment

- does not make the wound heal faster, but it can help body's natural healing process work fast.
- Cover the wound: Bandages can help keep the wound clean and keep harmful bacteria out.

First Aid Box

Every office, factory, home and school should have an accessible firstaid box with the following recommended basic contents:

- Band-aids (Plasters):Band-aids or sticking plasters are good for dressing small wounds. They come in all shapes and sizes for fingers, legs, and anywhere else you might get little cuts. Make sure the band aid is big enough to cover the wound, if not you should use a dressing instead.
- **Elastic Bandages:**The elastic bandages are good for wrapping sprained joints or making a sling in the case of a broken arm.
- Gauze and Adhesive Tape: Gauze-pads or rolls are cloth pads that are placed directly on a wound to protect and control bleeding (for larger cuts and scrapes). You will need adhesive tape to keep the gauze in place. In an emergency, a clean cloth, hand towel, can be used to cover the wound.
- Antiseptic Wipes (Alcohol Swabs) and Cotton Wool: These are used for cleaning the wounds.
- Safety Pins and Tweezers: Safety pins are used to fasten the bandages and tweezers are used for taking pieces of small stones out of wound.
- Scissors: A pair of scissors is needed to cut the tape and gauze.
- Latex Gloves: Latex gloves are always a good idea, especially if you are dealing with body fluids of a stranger.
- Calamine Lotion: Calamine lotion is used for soothing sunburns and stings.

What is the greatest pleasure of life? If anybody asks this question, different people may hold different views and acclaim aesthetic, intellectual, or typical ethical pleasure as their specific choice. There is, however, no second opinion that the greatest pleasures of life come from reading good books. Indeed, books bring immense joy, enlarge the frontiers of knowledge and

widen the outlook of the reader.

Happy is the man who acquires the habit of reading when he is young. He has secured a lifelong source of pleasure, instruction and inspiration. So long as he has his beloved books, he never feels lonely. He always has a pleasant occupation of **leisure** moments, so that he never feels bored. He is the possessor of wealth more precious than gold. Poor indeed is the man who does not read, and empty is his life.

The blessings which the reading habit **confers** on its possessor are many provided that we choose the right kind of books. Reading gives the highest kind of pleasure. We read some books, simply for pleasure and amusement. Good novels and books of imagination must have their place in everybody's reading. When we are tired or the



brain is weary with serious study, it is a healthy recreation to **immerse** ourselves in some absorbing story written by a master hand.

It is said, 'Reading is to the mind what exercise is to the body.' That is why a civilized man is drawn to a good book more than he is drawn to any other form of entertainment like the movies, the television or football and cricket. The pleasure derived from the other entertainment may also be good, but their effect is not as lasting as the effect of reading.

Different kinds of books give us different types of pleasure. There are numerous books to please and satisfy different readers. There are many informative books on history, biography, philosophy, religion, travel, and science which we ought to read, and which will give us not only pleasure but also education and knowledge. Apart from it, reading poetry also holds immense importance, for the best poetry gives us the noble thoughts and beautiful imaginings clothed in lovely and musical language.

As a matter of fact, books are our everlasting friends. They stay with us during the whole life: in babyhood we hear parents read us fairy tales, in our teens we **swallow** exciting suspense novels page after page and when we become adults we still find gripping books that absorb us. But today many

people say that modern life is so fast and full of action that they do not have time and desire to read books; they consider reading to be nothing more than waste of time. Furthermore there are a lot of people who are sure that products of modern technologies like computers can replace traditional books. Nevertheless, there are people, who receive pleasure from reading books and believe that books will never disappear from their lives. Précis:

A précis is a concise and clear statement of the substance of a longer passage in a connected and readable shape. A précis must be accurate, brief and clear. A précis should be about one-third of the original passage.

Rules for writing a good Précis:

(i) Determine the theme of the passage: It is very important to find out the central idea or the theme of the passage. Soon you will be analyzing the passage to separate the major points from the minor ones, and the various points become major only in relation to the central or main theme of the passage.

- (ii) Précis is not the reproduction of important sentences: Do not form your précis by reproducing a few sentences and deleting others. Précis writing is not the art of selection and deletion; it is the art of remodeling.
- (iii) Brevity is good but not at the cost of clarity: Brevity is the soul of précis writing. But brevity is not to be achieved at the cost of clarity. If the addition or retention of a few words add to the clarity of your précis, they should be included by all means.
- (iv) Use your own language: Précis has to be written, as far as possible, in your own words.
- (v) Précis is always written in the third person: If the author has used the autobiographical form of narration or description, you should change the form. You should begin your précis with 'The author says...' Secondly, you should avoid the use of direct speech in your précis. The use of indirect speech will make it more compact.

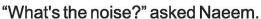

Third conditional sentences are used for untrue situations in the past. There meaning is untrue in the present and the past. We can also say that the third conditionals are used to talk about event or situations in the past that could have happened, but did not. In 'if clause' we use had + third form of verb and in 'result clause' we use would + have + third form of verb.

- Encourage students to write a story based on their personal experience.
- Explain transitive and intransitive verbs with the help of examples and invite them to give examples.

- Conduct a pre-reading activity by asking questions related to importance
 of struggle in life. After that ask one student to recite the poem aloud.
 Explain meanings of the difficult words and ask students to do the
 comprehension questions.
- Explain third conditional sentences with the help of the given examples and encourage students to make third conditional sentences. After that do the given activity of conditionals.
- Tell them the expressions of asking and telling directions and ask them to do the given activity.
